INDICATIONS

Moderate to Severe Rheumatoid Arthritis (RA)

Enbrel is indicated for reducing signs and symptoms, keeping joint damage from getting worse, and improving physical function in patients with moderately to severely active rheumatoid arthritis. Enbrel can be taken with methotrexate or used alone.

Psoriatic Arthritis (PsA)

Enbrel is indicated for reducing signs and symptoms, keeping joint damage from getting worse, and improving physical function in patients with psoriatic arthritis. Enbrel can be used with or without methotrexate.

Ankylosing Spondylitis (AS)

Enbrel is indicated for reducing signs and symptoms in patients with active ankylosing spondylitis.

Polyarticular Juvenile Idiopathic Arthritis (JIA)

Enbrel is indicated for reducing signs and symptoms of moderate to severe polyarticular juvenile idiopathic arthritis (JIA) in children ages 2 years and older.

Plaque Psoriasis (PsO)

Enbrel is indicated for the treatment of patients 4 years or older with chronic moderate to severe plaque psoriasis (PsO) who are candidates for systemic therapy or phototherapy.

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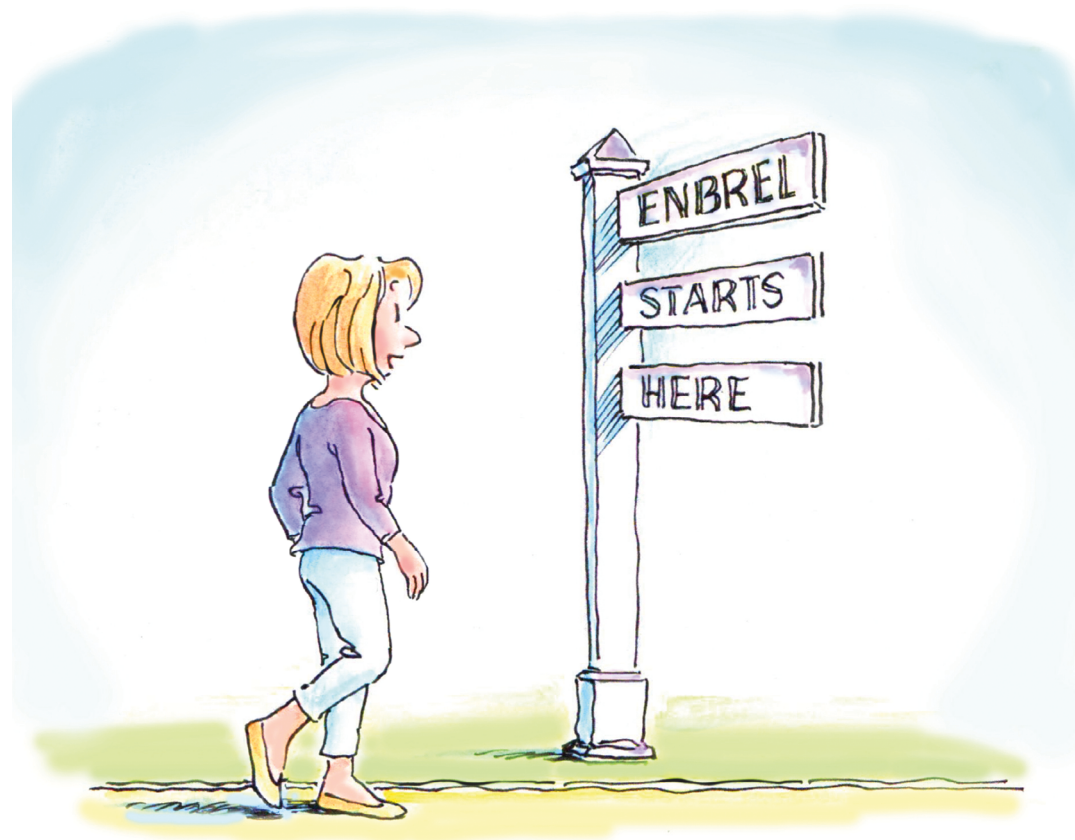

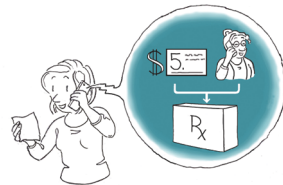

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Did You Know?



Your pharmacy will likely ask you for a “co-pay.” Here’s what you should know:

- If you’re unfamiliar with a “co-pay,” it’s also commonly referred to as your “out-of-pocket” cost. It’s the difference between what Enbrel costs and what your insurance provider will pay. It will vary based on your individual plan. If you are **commercially insured**, **ENBREL Support®** may be able to lower your out-of-pocket costs including co-payment, co-insurance and deductible with the Enbrel Co-Pay Card.* That’s why it’s so important to talk to **ENBREL Support®** before you hear from your Specialty Pharmacy.
- **There is no income requirement for eligibility when it comes to using the Co-Pay Card.**

Commercially Insured



If you’re commercially insured, you can call **ENBREL Support®** at **1-888-4ENBREL** (1-888-436-2735) or register at **EnbrelSupport.com** to enroll in the Enbrel Co-Pay Card program.* If you qualify, expect your card to arrive in 2 to 3 days. Generally, most commercially insured people are eligible, as your current household income is not a factor in determining eligibility.

The Enbrel Co-Pay Card can help eligible* commercially insured patients lower their out-of-pocket prescription costs for Enbrel.

The Enbrel Co-Pay Card is available at no additional cost to those who are eligible. Be prepared by applying for the Co-Pay Card now, so you have it when you need it.

“Commercially Insured” is also called private insurance. It refers to health insurance that’s available through work or a healthcare exchange.

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Getting Your Enbrel



Understanding How to Get Your Enbrel

Once your Enbrel prescription is approved by your insurance provider, the next step is to actually get your Enbrel medication.

You're going to get a call from a "Specialty Pharmacy" to arrange for delivery of your Enbrel.



You might not recognize the number, so until you have spoken to your Specialty Pharmacy, be sure to answer calls coming from unknown or unfamiliar numbers during this time.

Important!



If you don't hear from your **Specialty Pharmacy** in 7-10 days from the time you were prescribed Enbrel, call your doctor's office. They'll help direct you on what to do next.



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Did You Know?



A **Specialty Pharmacy** is a pharmacy that dispenses medications that may require special storage and/or handling, such as refrigeration. Enbrel is one of those medications.



Once your Specialty Pharmacy contacts you, you'll want to schedule the delivery of your medication at a time that makes sense for you. If it's your first time filling your prescription from the Specialty Pharmacy, here are some questions to ask to make the overall process easier:

- Will they keep your Enbrel Co-Pay Card (if you are eligible) and method of payment on file for refill purposes?
- How many refills do you have available? (Make sure to check with your doctor to see if you have refills.)
- Will you need another prior authorization at any time to in order to renew or refill your prescription? If so, make sure you speak with your doctor in advance to avoid interruptions in treatment.

Important!



It's so important that you or someone you trust is at home to receive your Enbrel, because it needs to be refrigerated. When it does arrive, be sure to store it in the refrigerator immediately. If home delivery won't work, ask if you can arrange delivery to your place of employment.

Now that you have information on receiving your Enbrel, go to the "Establishing Your Routine" section for information to help you establish your routine.

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What is the most important information I should know about ENBREL?

ENBREL is a medicine that affects your immune system. ENBREL can lower the ability of your immune system to fight infections. Serious infections have happened in patients taking ENBREL. These infections include tuberculosis (TB) and infections caused by viruses, fungi, or bacteria that have spread throughout the body. Some patients have died from these infections. Your healthcare provider should test you for TB before you take ENBREL and monitor you closely for TB before, during, and after ENBREL treatment, even if you have tested negative for TB.

There have been some cases of unusual cancers, some resulting in death, reported in children and teenage patients who started using tumor necrosis factor (TNF) blockers before 18 years of age. Also, for children, teenagers, and adults taking TNF blockers, including ENBREL, the chances of getting lymphoma or other cancers may increase. Patients with RA may be more likely to get lymphoma.

Before starting ENBREL, tell your healthcare provider if you:

- Have any existing medical conditions
- Are taking any medicines, including herbals
- Think you have, are being treated for, have signs of, or are prone to infection. You should not start taking ENBREL if you have any kind of infection, unless your healthcare provider says it is okay
- Have any open cuts or sores
- Have diabetes, HIV, or a weak immune system
- Have TB or have been in close contact with someone who has had TB
- Were born in, lived in, or traveled to countries where there is more risk for getting TB. Ask your healthcare provider if you are not sure
- Live, have lived in, or traveled to certain parts of the country (such as, the Ohio and Mississippi River valleys, or the Southwest) where there is a greater risk for certain kinds of fungal infections, such as histoplasmosis. These infections may develop or become more severe if you take ENBREL. If you don't know if these infections are common in the areas you've been to, ask your healthcare provider



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Important Safety Information (continued)

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- Have or have had hepatitis B
- Have or have had heart failure
- Develop symptoms such as persistent fever, bruising, bleeding, or paleness while taking ENBREL
- Use the medicine Kineret (anakinra), Orencia (abatacept), or Cytoxan (cyclophosphamide)
- Are taking anti-diabetic medicines
- Have, have had, or develop a serious nervous disorder, seizures, any numbness or tingling, or a disease that affects your nervous system such as multiple sclerosis or Guillain-Barré syndrome
- Are scheduled to have surgery
- Have recently received or are scheduled for any vaccines. All vaccines should be brought up-to-date before starting ENBREL. Patients taking ENBREL should not receive live vaccines.
- Are allergic to rubber or latex
- Are pregnant, planning to become pregnant, or breastfeeding
- Have been around someone with chicken pox

What are the possible side effects of ENBREL?

ENBREL can cause serious side effects including: New infections or worsening of infections you already have; **hepatitis B** can become active if you already have had it; **nervous system problems**, such as multiple sclerosis, seizures, or inflammation of the nerves of the eyes; **blood problems** (some fatal); new or worsening **heart failure**; new or worsening **psoriasis**; **allergic reactions**; **autoimmune reactions**, including a lupus-like syndrome and autoimmune hepatitis.

Common side effects include: Injection site reactions and upper respiratory infections (sinus infections).

In general, side effects in children were similar in frequency and type as those seen in adult patients. The types of infections reported were generally mild and similar to those usually seen in children.

These are not all the side effects with ENBREL. Tell your healthcare provider about any side effect that bothers you or does not go away.

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Establishing Your Routine



Establishing Your Routine

At this point, you've scheduled the delivery of your Enbrel prescription. While you wait for it to arrive, let's start planning an injection routine that fits your schedule.

One of the most important things you can do is to take Enbrel as prescribed by your doctor. **And that means setting up a consistent injection routine and schedule.** Here are tips to get you started:



Pick a day and time. Since consistency is so important, think of a good time and day of the week that allows you to take your ENBREL without interruptions. Some people prefer to take their ENBREL in the morning, others in the evening. Some like to start the week with the injection and others on the weekend. Whatever works for you, just keep to a routine and be sure to give yourself enough time so you aren't rushed. You may find that using a calendar or your mobile phone to set reminders is helpful.

Helpful Tip



An easy way to remember to stay on top of your injection routine is to pair it with an activity you do every week. Maybe it's after your weekly trip to the grocery store, or before your Sunday morning walk, or even during your favorite weekly TV show.



Refill Reminders. In addition to setting reminders for your injection, be sure to note when you'll receive refills of your Enbrel and mark those on your calendar as well. **Don't forget to stay in touch with your doctor to see if you need refills to avoid a situation where you're without your prescribed Enbrel medication.**



Take it out 30 minutes prior to injection. Make sure you take your ENBREL out of the refrigerator at least 30 minutes before injecting so it reaches room temperature in time for injection. The injection may be more comfortable if the medication has fully reached room temperature, so if it helps to leave it out a little longer, that's okay too.

Important!



Enbrel can be kept at room temperature between 68°F and 77°F (20°C and 25°C) for up to 14 days. So not only can you travel with Enbrel, you can use it even if you leave it out on the counter a bit longer than you had planned.



Have supplies ready. Before you inject with Enbrel, gather your alcohol wipes, the sharps disposal container, cotton ball, and a Band-Aid.

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Adult Patients

Enbrel is administered by subcutaneous injection.

DOSING AND ADMINISTRATION FOR ADULT PATIENTS

Indication	Recommended Dose
Adult RA, AS, and PsA	50 mg weekly
Adult PsO	Starting Dose: 50 mg twice weekly for 3 months Maintenance Dose: 50 mg once weekly

ADULT RHEUMATOID ARTHRITIS, ANKYLOSING SPONDYLITIS, AND PSORIATIC ARTHRITIS PATIENTS

Methotrexate, glucocorticoids, salicylates, nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), or analgesics may be continued during treatment with Enbrel.

Based on a study of 50 mg Enbrel twice weekly in patients with RA that suggested higher incidence of adverse reactions but similar American College of Rheumatology (ACR) response rates, doses higher than 50 mg per week are not recommended.

ADULT PLAQUE PSORIASIS PATIENTS: In addition to the 50 mg twice-weekly starting dose, doses of 25 mg or 50 mg per week were shown to be effective. The proportion of responders was related to the Enbrel dosage.

Pediatric Patients

Enbrel is administered by subcutaneous injection.

DOSING AND ADMINISTRATION FOR PEDIATRIC PATIENTS (PsO or JIA)

Pediatric Patient's Weight	Recommended Dose
63 kg (138 pounds) or more	50 mg weekly
Less than 63 kg (138 pounds)	0.8 mg/kg weekly

To achieve pediatric doses other than 25 mg or 50 mg, use the Enbrel single-dose vial.

Doses of Enbrel higher than those described in the table above have not been studied in pediatric patients.

In JIA patients, glucocorticoids, NSAIDs, or analgesics may be continued during treatment with Enbrel.



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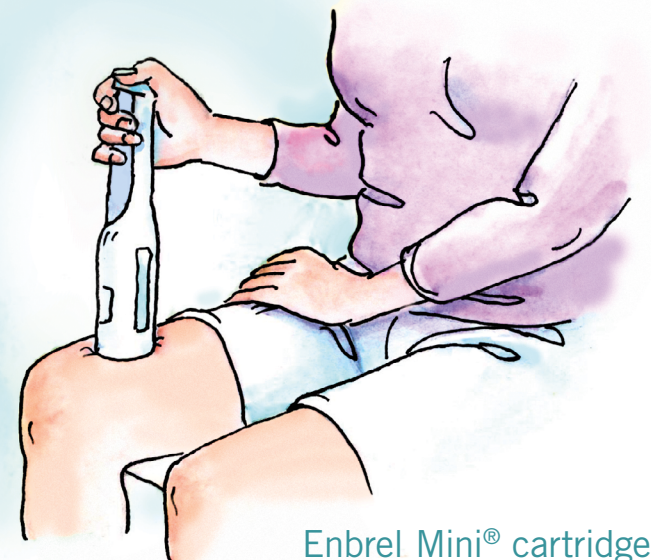

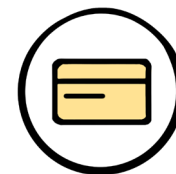

Enbrel Mini® Cartridge with AutoTouch® AutoInjector



The Enbrel Mini® cartridge with AutoTouch® autoinjector is a prefilled cartridge with a reusable autoinjector. Designed with patients in mind, it has sound cues that let you know your injection is complete, a progress bar that helps track the injection from start to finish, and a hidden-needle design that activates with skin contact. It's also designed for a one-handed injection, so you don't need to pinch or stretch your skin.

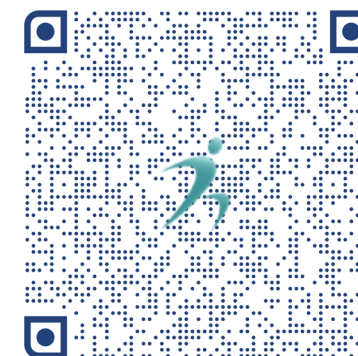

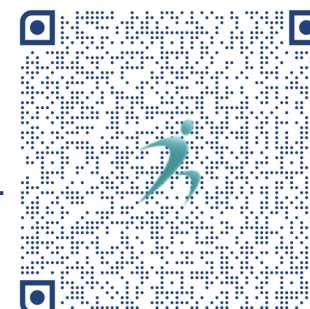

HOW TO STORE ENBREL ON A TRIP

- **Do not** place Enbrel in your checked baggage.

- If needed, you may store Enbrel at room temperature between 68°F and 77°F (20°C and 25°C) for up to 14 days.

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How Enbrel Works



How ENBREL Works in the Body

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How joint pain and joint damage can start

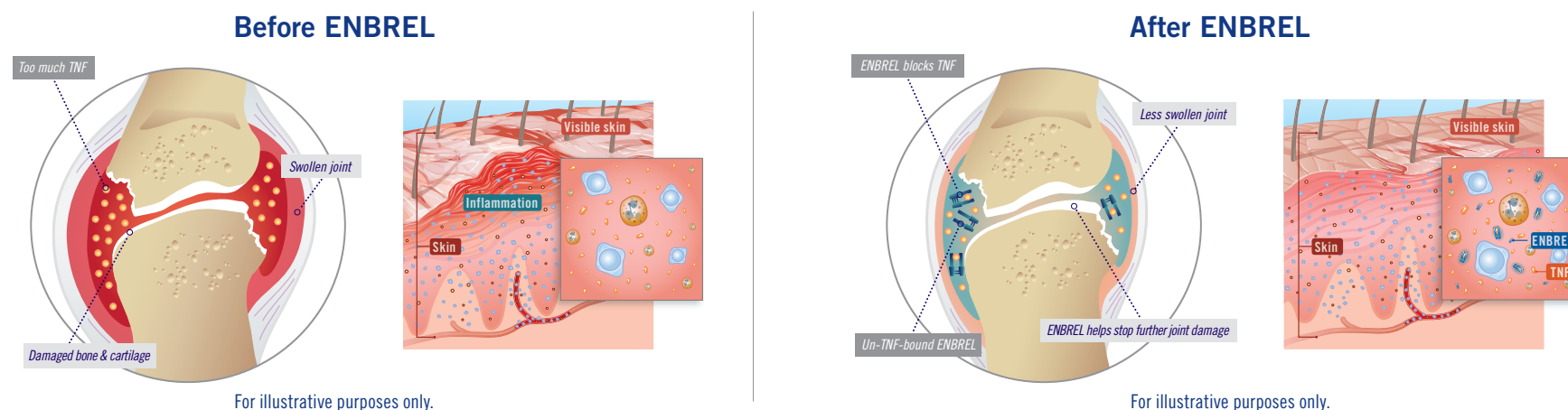
Your immune system protects your body from infections and diseases. But, if it isn't working right, it can actually cause harm to your body. If you have moderate to severe RA or psoriatic arthritis, your immune system makes too much of a certain protein called tumor necrosis factor (TNF). Excessive TNF can cause increased inflammation, which can result in permanent joint damage.

For those with moderate to severe plaque psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis, excessive TNF can also cause patches of red, thick skin with silvery scales, or changes in the nail, such as pitting (small depressions in the surface of the nail).

How ENBREL Works

ENBREL is a type of medicine known as a biologic (a treatment made from living things, like cells) and is designed to attach to TNF proteins to help block their activity. With fewer active TNF proteins, ENBREL can help you have fewer symptoms, like joint pain and swelling, all while stopping further irreversible joint damage.

Because ENBREL works on your immune system, it can make it harder to fight infections like the flu. If you develop an infection while taking ENBREL, you should consult your physician right away.



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In addition to following your doctor's treatment plan, make sure you are taking care of YOU. That can include taking the time to make positive and healthy lifestyle choices and thinking about ways you can help to self-manage your condition, both physically and emotionally.

While these choices won't necessarily impact how Enbrel works for you, they may make a difference in how your condition impacts your day-to-day activities and your outlook. Having things like the right fitness plan and/or diet and a positive attitude can go a long way toward helping manage your condition.

On the following page are some tips that may help you.

Staying Active

Exercising may be the last thing on your mind, especially if you are experiencing severe symptoms. But with symptom relief, you may be thinking of how you can return to activities that are important to you, including exercise.

You should start by talking to your doctor—they're likely going to recommend starting slow. That might include not taking up any vigorous activities immediately and starting slowly at your own pace. For example, you can set aside time to take regular walks, or join a beginner fitness class.

Make sure you talk with your doctor, and together, you can come up with a plan on how you can increase your physical activity. Be sure to tell your doctor how it is going and what changes you can make over time.



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Healthy Diet

Adopting a healthy diet can be especially helpful when paired with the right exercise.

Try introducing a diet that is low in processed foods and saturated fat and replacing it with anti-inflammatory foods such as fruits and veggies, particularly berries, cherries, and leafy greens.

Make sure to drink water and stay hydrated, especially if you have increased your physical activity.

Again, talk to your doctor about what you can do with your diet to help reduce inflammation and increase energy.



Keeping Positive

Savor the little things. Something simple like opening a jar or spending an afternoon with a loved one can be celebrated.

You don't want to overdo it, so take a break every now and then and relax with your favorite TV show or a good book.

If the stress of managing your condition is a problem, one thing you can consider is installing a meditation app on your phone. Stress management is important, and taking the time to meditate and relax can be extremely helpful.



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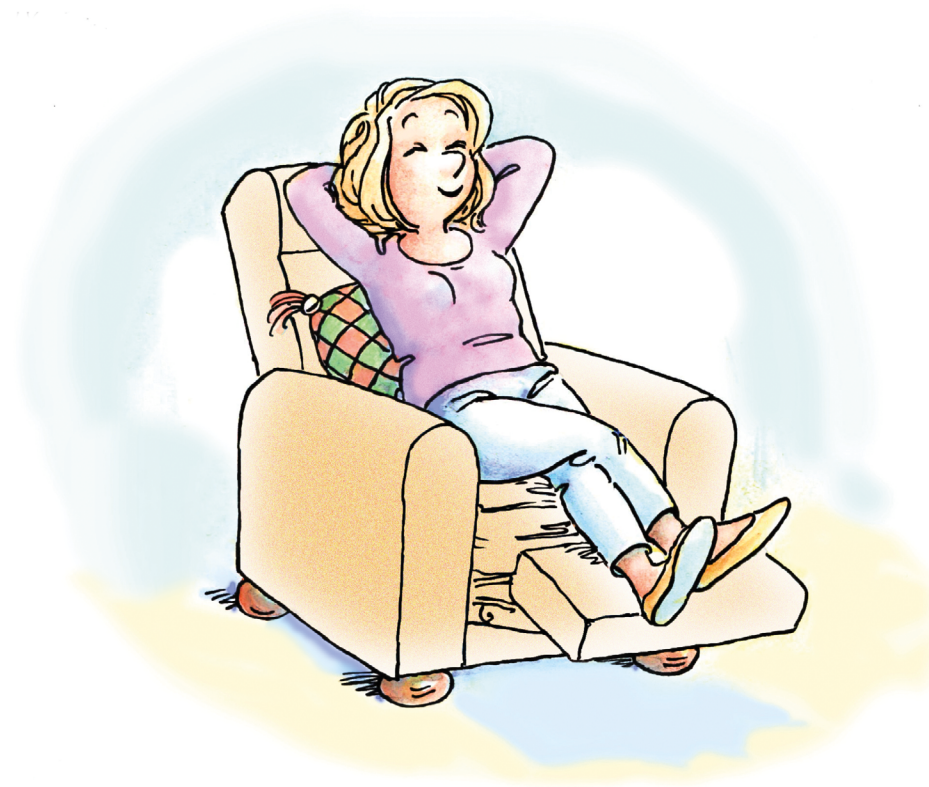
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All the Little Things

Don't sweat the small stuff. For example, if you can't make the dinner outing with your friends, it's okay. When symptoms are flaring or you're not feeling well, you should give yourself the permission to take care of yourself.

Keeping things in perspective. Some days you may get angry because things take longer to do, or you just can't do them all together, and that is okay. The chronic nature of your condition means there will be some tough days. When they happen, take things at your own pace, and don't feel bad about it.

Planning ahead. Planning things out in advance can be very important when managing your condition. On your good days take time to prepare for any bad days ahead, such as preparing food that you can store for later or working on activities that may be harder to do on your bad days. Just be sure not to overdo it on the good days and run yourself down.



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ACKNOWLEDGING YOUR ROLE

Chronic conditions can make life very difficult not only for the patient but also for their caregivers and loved ones. What feels like a never-ending struggle makes it hard to always know what's happening in your loved one's body, what is needed to ease their suffering, and what you can do to brighten their day. This section of the Enbrel® guide was not only created to support you in helping your loved one—it's also about how to help yourself. By learning to communicate and share with your loved one about your mutual needs, you can understand what questions to ask,

what expectations to have, and concrete ways you can help care for them.

HOW ARE THEY FEELING?

Your loved one may be experiencing emotions such as anxiety, fear, frustration, despair, or even anger. Given the challenges of their condition, these emotions are very common, and quite normal. It's important to recognize that they have just begun a new treatment, and that this may be the latest in perhaps a long line of medications to treat their condition. The cycle of hope and frustration that comes with starting new medication can be challenging. And at the end of the day, they simply want to feel better—for themselves and for those they care about.

THE HIDDEN NATURE OF CHRONIC, INFLAMMATORY CONDITIONS

Not all chronic conditions are visible on the outside. Your loved one may look fine, but may be in significant physical pain that limits their ability to do what may appear to others to be simple and effortless everyday activities. When symptoms are bad, it can be difficult to keep pace with the demands of an everyday busy life. Over time, they may be unwilling to commit to making plans in the near or distant future, and may even cancel planned activities at the last minute because of how they are feeling.

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EMPATHY AND ACCEPTANCE

Your loved one may feel that no one can really understand what they are going through. Trying to imagine what your loved one is going through, and being more aware of their emotions, can demonstrate caring and support. Try to accept what your loved one is telling you about how they are feeling, and what they are able to do—as well as no longer able to do.

SOME WAYS YOU CAN OFFER TO HELP

- **Actively listen** to your loved one when hearing or witnessing any of their limitations. Even when faithfully following their doctor-prescribed treatment routine, there may be some “bad days” when their symptoms are more severe.
- **Get involved.** If your loved one is seeking to make lifestyle changes such as adjusting their eating habits, ask what you can do to be a part of it. Perhaps research which foods may help reduce inflammation and offer to cook a special meal.

- Understand there will be good days and bad ones. Even with treatment, bad days are often a reality of a chronic inflammatory condition. So be mindful that plans may change. If you’re sensing it may be a bad day, you might simply ask, **“are you still feeling up for this today?”** If the answer is “no” or “not really,” try to readily accept that answer and come up with a different plan.
- Perhaps most importantly of all, **be encouraging.** Your loved one may be on a difficult journey with their medical condition. They may be experiencing a loss of control over their situation, a lack of motivation, or even hopelessness. Celebrate the “good days” with them, comfort them on the “bad days,” and do everything you can to maintain a positive outlook.

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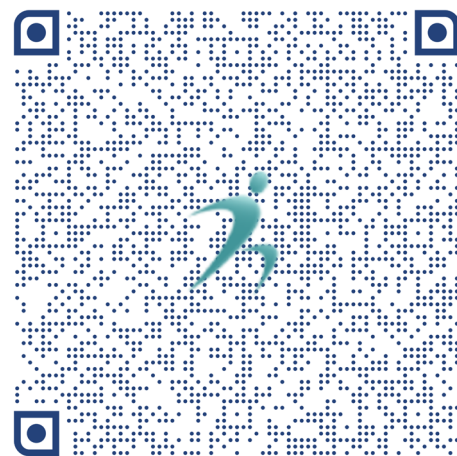
