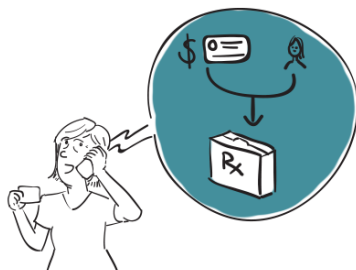

Must dos

- Complete the labs ordered by your doctor
- Complete in-office injection training
- Create a care team list (your doctor, the specialty pharmacy that supplies your ENBREL)

- Call ENBREL Support™ to discuss financial support options
- Commercially Insured? Ask about how the Enbrel® Co-Pay Card* can help lower your out-of-pocket prescription costs
- Medicare, Medicaid or no insurance? We have specialists that can help

- If you have an Enbrel® Co-Pay Card*, tell your specialty pharmacy when they call
- Schedule delivery for when you are home and store your ENBREL in the refrigerator when it arrives

- Set up injection reminders
- Set up refill reminders
- Decide how you will monitor and track your symptoms

- Read and follow the instructions for use to complete your injection
- Dispose of materials properly
- Track your symptoms and note your next injection date

Behind the scenes

Specialty pharmacy is notified of your prescription by your doctor and works with your insurance provider to confirm coverage and prescription costs

If eligible, your Co-Pay Card* is shipped to you by ENBREL. Assume 2-3 days for your card to arrive

If you have an Enbrel® Co-Pay Card*, your benefit is applied automatically
ENBREL is shipped to you by your specialty pharmacy
